### Research in Progress

*Representation as an Institution: Congresses as Agents of Citizens and Party in Mainland China.* This project, supported by the National Science Foundation and University of Wisconsin–Madison Graduate School, uses published Chinese-language primary and secondary sources, qualitative field research, and original representative sample surveys of members of congresses and the mass public to investigate the ongoing transformation from descriptive to substantive representation in local Chinese congresses.
