- Conducted extensive pre-doctorial (one and a half years) fieldwork in Yunnan in the mid-1990s.
- Awarded a Ph.D. in cultural anthropology from the Duke University in 1997
- Joined the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1999.
- In fall 1999 took a leave of absence to work as a visiting research fellow at the East Asian Institute at the National University of Singapore.
- In the academic year of 2001-2002, served as a fellow at the Woodrow Wilson Center for International Scholars in Washington, DC.

**Research Focus:** Two themes dominate: (i) the relationship of civil society and state in modern China, and (ii) technology, governance and social change in China.

**Graduate Training Focus:** Graduate students in the cultural section of the Anthropology Department who focus on the social dimension of technological development and those students with geographical focus on East Asia.
